MARILYN MASON'S playing combines the richness of maturity with the vitality of youth. Still in her twenties, she has demonstrated a striking authority and brilliance which have earned her an enviable reputation. She scored outstanding successes at two national conventions of the American Guild of Organists in New York and Boston, and she has been heard widely in the United States and Canada on transcontinental concert tours.

Since 1947, Miss Mason has been a member of the faculty of the University of Michigan. Previously, she was a student there of the late Palmer Christian. Later she studied with Nadia Boulanger in Paris, and Arnold Schoenberg at the University of Calfornia.

Miss Mason's repertoire is all-inclusive. She has a special interest in contemporary works, has played many first performances, and has been praised for her interpretations of unusual clarity and discernment.
