## ORGAN RECITALS

A special series of organ recitals will be presented on three consecutive Tuesdays in November—the 8th, 15th and 22nd—at 8:30 P.M. On these hour-long radio broadcasts, Marilyn Mason, Instructor in Organ at the University of Michigan, will perform for WUOM-WFUM audiences three programs which she recently gave at Columbia University. Miss Mason received both her Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from the University of Michigan, and later was granted a certificate of music from the Fontainebleau School of Music in Paris. In 1953, she obtained the doctorate of sacred music from the Union Theological Seminary, New York. In addition to extensive concertizing throughout the United States and Canada, Miss Mason has made several long-playing recordings. Since 1947, she has held the position of Instructor in Organ in the University of Michigan's School of Music. Her forthcoming November radio recitals, to be given on the Frieze Memorial Organ in Hill Auditorium, are listed in their entirety on the reverse side.

## THE CZECH SONG SUNDAYS, 2:00 P.M.

Beginning November 20, Barton Wimble will be heard as commentator on this new series of programs exploring the history of Czech music from the earliest times to the present. Mr. Wimble owns one of the largest collections in this country of recordings featuring the musicians and composers of Czechoslovakia. Starting with the student songs and dances and the Hussite hymns of the 15th century, Mr. Wimble will play the music of such composers as Benda and Skroup. Later programs will be devoted to the prominent names in Czech music such as Dvořák, Smetana, Fibich, Foerster, Janáček and Martinu. The final program in the series will be concerned with musical trends since 1930 with emphasis on the continuity of national feeling and expression during the various occupations of the country by foreign powers.
