MARILYN MASON heads the Organ Department at the University of Michigan. She studied in Paris with Nadia Boulanger and Maurice Duruflé, and later in this country with Arnold Schoenberg. A native of Oklahoma, she graduated from the New England Conservatory of Music. She has traveled extensively as a concert artist.

FERNANDO GERMANI, born and trained in Rome, studied with Respighi and has been especially active as teacher and performer in his native city. Coming to this country, he was head of the Organ Department at the Curtis Institute for two years. He has revised and edited the complete organ works of Frescobaldi.
