## DEDICATION OF THE NEW SCHLICKER ORGAN

To the dear people of Grace Church:

Can it really be true we are dedicating the completed new organ of Grace Church? So long have I lived with the original challenge and the urgent need of replacing the old organ, parts of which went back to the last century. But in other respects the time has been brief indeed, for organs like ours are not built and paid for in the twinkling of an eye. For the sincere concern and the generous support of all of you I am truly grateful and appreciative. Your gifts have enabled us to come to this day, and I thank you profoundly. We stand in need of further funds, but meanwhile what has been achieved is noteworthy indeed and I rejoice with you.

It was back on Easter Day in 1961 that we launched our appeal. That same year I quoted from a church bulletin somewhere as follows, "The organ is the monarch of musical instruments. . . . No other can lead the congregation in the singing of hymns, accompany the choir in the musical portions of the liturgy, and permeate an edifice with an aura of spiritual devotion more compellingly yet unobtrusively than the organ."

I am reminded today of another occasion when I myself wrote on this same subject, "The organ is the voice of the church. . . . The organ's is a living and breathing sound, is it not? It moves and vibrates. It has a heavenly, holy sound in our ears thanks to its long association with the church and with Christian worship. There is a majesty about its music. It calms the spirit. It elevates the soul. Its language is sublime. On the day of mourning it speaks in quiet, soothing comfort. On a festal day it leaps and dances in joy and ecstasy. How silent the church would be without it."

Grace Church has long been celebrated for the excellence of its music, and it will continue to be so heralded with our new Schlicker organ and under Frank Smith. I am glad indeed we have come to this day of the dedication of the new and completed instrument, in both its chancel and nave divisions, and I am deeply thankful for you and with you that it is so.

The Rector, the Church Wardens and the Chairman of the Organ Fund Committee having gathered at the center of the choir, near unto the chancel steps,

#### The Organ Fund Committee Chairman will address the Rector:

Reverend Sir: On behalf of the Congregation and Parish of Grace Church in the City of New York, I present to you as Rector this Organ to proclaim the glory and praise of God in the worship offered unto him in this place.

#### The Senior Warden will address the Rector:

Reverend Sir: On behalf of the Church Wardens and Vestrymen of the Parish of Grace Church in the City of New York, I ask you to declare this Organ to be from henceforth among the appurtenances of Grace Church, for use in the worship of Almighty God, and to reveal his glory and beauty through the Ministry of Music.

#### The Rector:

I receive and accept this Organ to proclaim the glory and praise of God and to show forth his beauty and loveliness in the Ministry of Music, and I declare it from hence forth set apart for this purpose.

#### The Junior Warden will address the Rector:

Reverend Sir: I ask you now to offer Prayer and Thanksgiving to Almighty God, through Jesus Christ our Lord, that this Organ may be blessed by him, and dedicated to his honor and glory.

More especially at this time we praise thee for the craftsmen and artisans who have planned and constructed this instrument, for the workmen who have prepared a place for it; May their labors be acceptable in thy sight and may we remember their work with loving gratitude and thus be ever aware of our dependence upon one another in common endeavor for the making of all good and worthy things. Accept our thanks O Father for the sake of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord who, with thee and the Holy Spirit, liveth and reigneth one God, world without end. Amen.

#### The Identical Consoles

Both Chancel and Gallery divisions of the organ are playable from either console, either together or separately, by means of tilting on-or-off tablets.

The manuals and manuals-to-pedal couplers are as follows:

#### Couplers

Swell to Swell 16' and 4'
Swell to Great 16', 8' and 4'
Swell to Positiv 8' and 4'
Swell to Pedal 8'
Positiv to Great 16' and 8'

Chancel Great on Positiv (Tilting tablet)

#### Pistons

Reversible pistons are provided on toe studs and under each manual for Swell, Great and Positiv to Pedal couplers.

Twelve General pistons, six operated manually and six by means of toe-studs, are provided for combinations of stops. A General Cancel piston is operated manually or by toe-stud.

Separate Chancel and Gallery pistons for each manual are provided as follows: Three each for Chancel Swell, Great and Pedal;

Five each for Gallery Swell and Great; four each for Gallery Positiv and Pedal.

#### Expression

An expression pedal is provided for each Swell division. A third pedal controls the general Crescendo, or gradual addition of stops to full organ.

### A History of Organs in Grace Church

"The history of the organs of Grace Church is in a sense the history of organ building in America, for the Parish has used the foremost geniuses of each generation to re-build existing organs or construct new ones." This statement, written in 1914 to describe the then existing organs, could as well be said today.

Grace Church was consecrated in 1846, its Gothic edifice the work of the young architect, James Renwick, Jr. The original gallery organ and console by Henry Erben was still in use when in 1878 Hilbourne L. Roosevelt completed a new organ of 71 stops in the chancel, the gift of Catharine Lorillard Wolfe. A choir had been installed there to replace the solo quartette and choir which had sung for many years from the gallery. A chamber (still in use) was built for the chancel organ in the

angle formed by the east wall of the south transept and the chancel wall. The chamber is actually outside the church walls—the sound then and now enters the church through what had been outside windows.

For the dedication of this organ we are told "a unique and beautiful program was made by Tiffany, in the form of a richly illuminated four-page pamphlet on stiff boards, the cover showing the tower and spire of Grace Church, and having a cartouche for the title, which was distributed to those present by Miss Wolfe." The dedicatory recital on May 22, 1878, was planned by Samuel P. Warren, then organist and choir master, assisted by several recitalists including Dudley Buck.

An echo organ also by Roosevett, situated in the roof over the intersection of the nave and transept, consisting of two stops brought from Machinery Hall of the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition of 1876, a Vox Humana and Quintadena, was, with the Erben gallery organ, playable from either console.

In 1902 during the long tenure of James Morris Helfenstein as organist and choir master, the young and almost unknown Ernest M. Skinner was selected to replace the gallery organ. The new instrument was the gift of George S. and Julia Grinnell Bowdoin. It was the second organ the Skinner factory, then in New York City, had produced. In 1914 he completed a new chancel organ, the gift of George Coe Graves, and restored and improved the present Chantry organ which then was also playable from the chancel console.

Toward the close of 1928, in consultation with Ernest Mitchell who became organist and choir master in 1922, the Skinner firm rebuilt and enlarged the 1902 gallery organ, making both organs playable from one console in the chancel.

In 1961 it was decided to replace the Skinner instrument with an entirely new organ built along classical lines. Herman L. Schlicker, president of the Schlicker Organ Company of Buffalo, New York, was selected to design and build the present organ. The total cost of the organ in its two divisions, with cabinet work and preparation of the organ spaces, will be approximately \$135,000. A major portion of this amount was contributed prior to its dedication by over 400 members and other friends of Grace Church listed separately in this booklet.

The organ has 74 voices, 101 ranks and includes duplicate three-manual consoles for gallery and chancel, to afford complete control over the total resources of the instrument from either location. Unnicked pipe-work is featured throughout, and slider chests are utilized in the gallery organ.

The chancel organ was completed in May, 1964. Speaking pipes replaced old non-speaking display pipes which had obscured the window tracery, now restored to view. This division comprises twenty-four voices, and is intended for choir accompaniment, as a continuo instrument for choir and small instrumental ensemble, and as a small antiphonal foil to the larger gallery organ of fifty voices.

The gallery organ is designed for recital use, and to support congregational singing. Its console has a movable cable, which will allow for different placings of performer and console in conjunction with small orchestral ensembles in the gallery's forward area.

It is this division of the organ which contains the 'big guns'—in the pedals, the Principal, a thirty-two foot long wooden stop retained from the old organ, and the Contra-Bombarde; in the manuals, the fanfare trumpet stop—Trompeta Real—a truly 'Royal Trumpet,' may be seen suspended, in part, over the gallery rail.
