MARILYN MASON

MARILYN MASON is University Organist and Chairman of the Organ Department at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. She has been guest Professor at Columbia University and also at Union Theological Seminary, where she earned the degree Doctor of Sacred Music. The University of Michigan honored her, in 1972, with the Distinguished Faculty Achievement Award. Marilyn Mason was the first woman organist to play in Latin America, and the first American organist to play in Egypt. Numerous invitations have taken her to five continents; North and South America, Europe, Africa, and Australia. She has served as adjudicator at almost every major competition in the world; her own repertoire is immense, covering every period of literature. Her artistic achievements as a recitalist, teacher, judge, and recorder are extensive. In further contribution to her profession, she has commissioned over thirty works by contemporary American composers, each dedicated to her and premiered by her.
