Seventy-seventh Concert, 1978-1979

Gustave Rosseels, Professor of Violin and Chamber Music in the University of Michigan School of Music, began an early retirement this past September. Best-known to Ann Arbor audiences as a member of the Stanley Quartet and the Baroque Trio, Mr. Rosseels was also a member of the famed Paganini Quartet for eleven years before joining the U of M faculty.

A native of Malines, Belgium, he graduated with highest distinction in chamber music and violin from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Brussels and later served on that faculty. After an active career in Europe as first violinist of the Pro Nova Quartet, he came to the United States in 1946 to join the newly-formed Paganini Quartet. In addition to his appearances with the Stanley Quartet and the Baroque Trio, Professor Rosseels has performed frequently as soloist and in sonata recitals in Ann Arbor and elsewhere. His repertory includes not only classical and romantic works but also a great many contemporary compositions, several of which were dedicated to him and first performed in Ann Arbor.

Professor Rosseels is listed in Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians, Who's Who in the Midwest, the International Who's Who in Music, and Men of Achievement.
