# MARILYN MASON, guest soloist



Marilyn Mason is University Organist and Chairman of the Organ Department of The University of Michigan. Her extensive career as concert organist, lecturer, adjudicator and teacher has carried her throughout the Western world. She was the first American women to play in Westminster Abbey, the first woman organist to play in Latin America, and the first American organist to play in Egypt. During one single year, invitations took her to five different continents. She has served as adjudicator at almost every major competition in the world. Marilyn Mason's dedication to contemporary music is evidenced in the 40 organ works which she has commissioned and premiered. Currently she is pursuing her commitment to stylistic integrity through scholarly research into the construction and tonal design of historic European instruments. Recently sixteen research tours have focused on historic organs in France, North Germany, Saxony, and Spain.

In 1987 she was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Music degree by The University of Nebraska, where she had served as consultant for the Casavant mechanical action organ. Recently, she was chosen Performer of the Year by the New York Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and presented a concert of commissioned works at the Riverside Church, New York City.

Her discography includes music of Bach, Handel, Mondonville, and contemporary composers on Columbia and Musical Heritage labels. Professor Mason last performed Saint Saen's **Organ Symphony** with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in February, 1991.

# The Organ

The Adrian College Chapel pipe organ designed, built, and installed by Organcraft Associates of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, has been acclaimed a highly superior instrument by such virtuosos as Alexander Schreiner and Virgil Fox. In planning the new organ, certain tonal pipes from the revered Hutchings-Votey Organ, in the former college chapel in Downs Hall were incorporated. In all there are 2,100 pipes ranging from three inches to sixteen feet in size.

# The Adrian College Chapel

The Adrian College Chapel, opened in the spring of 1964, is described as one of the most beautiful campus chapels in America. The chapel is dedicated to Katherine Elizabeth Herrick, the mother of the donor. One thousand people can be seated in the sanctuary and an eighty voice choir accommodated in the choir pews.

The sanctuary windows were designed by the Willett Stained Glass Studios of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and have gained national interest. The eight windows on the north represent the development of Christian beliefs and the Christian Church prior to the Reformation. The windows beginning on the viewers right upon entering the sancturary are entitled "God the Father", "God the Son", "God the Holy Spirit", "The Trinity", "Council of Nicea", "Protestant Foundation", "Christian Service" and "The Right to Dissent". The eight windows on the south unfold the development of Protestantism with emphasis on the Methodist Church and Methodist higher education at Adrian College.

These windows starting to the left of the altar are entitled; "The Reformation", "The Reformation in England", Tyndale and the Bible", "John Wesley", "Methodism in America", "Methodist Reformation", "Adrian College" and "Union of Methodism".

The Narthex windows were also designed, constructed and installed by the Willett Stained Glass Studios. The three narthex windows provide their own singular theme. The figure of Christ dominates the central window. The ever widening rays and swirling shapes symbolize the power and influence of Christ. These spread into the two side panels and symbolize the varied responses of humanity to the call of our Savior.
